You and Your Student

Partners in Your Student's Education

Things are about to change as your student begins college. Parents who have been through this before advise other parents to keep the communication lines open and to demonstrate your interest in your student by being informed, supportive and understanding.

One of the best sources of information for parents is the Transylvania website. Visit

www.transy.edu often for the latest in campus news. There's even a special section for parents. It also is important to show trust in your student. Although it can be unsettling as students begin making decisions without their parents' input, it is part of growing and maturing into a responsible adult.

The partnership between Transylvania and parents can enhance a student's transition from home to college and beyond. To prepare for the changes that lie ahead, set aside time with your son or daughter to discuss the following:

Academic Performance

Discuss course load, types of classes, study skills and an acceptable range for academic performance so you and your student will have a mutual understanding about expectations.

Finances

List anticipated expenses, and then work together to develop a budget. Establish a checking and/or a charge account.

Visits

Your student probably will want to come home for special events. Make sure he or she knows your plans far enough in advance to plan for social activities and studying. Visit your student on campus and get to know friends and roommates.

Phone calls, mail and email

Students love to receive calls, cards, letters, email and text messages from their families.

Family Weekend

Academic Information

Transylvania operates on a 4-4-1 academic year, with two 14-week terms (fall and winter) and a one-month term in May. An August term is also required for first-year students. Students normally take four one-unit courses during both the fall and winter terms and one full-unit course during May term. This system works well for students pursuing off-campus and study abroad opportunities during the school year and summer.

The three-week August term is an academic and extracurricular program that prepares entering first-year students for academic success and personal growth and earns them one unit of credit for the First Engagements Seminar. Students read and discuss books and participate in student-life programs that orient them to college.

Academic Advising

Upon admission to the university, students are paired with a faculty mentor/adviser who also serves as the student's instructor for the First Engagements Seminar. Students will stay with this same adviser throughout their first year. They are given the opportunity to change advisers in April. Once a student declares a major, they are encouraged to select an adviser within their academic program or division.

Grade Point Average

Students must maintain a minimum grade point average to remain in good academic standing. First-year students must earn 1.66, sophomores 1.85 and juniors and seniors 2.0. If at the end of the first term of attendance at Transylvania a student has a GPA of less than 1.0, the student may be suspended from the university.

Registrar's Office

The registrar's office_prepares and maintains student records, publishes the course schedule, enforces academic policies and coordinates academic advising. The office provides verification of enrollment for such things as insurance, good student discounts and jury duty exemptions.

Financial Requirements for Registration

Student accounts must be current for the student to register for the next term's classes. Registration dates are listed on the academic calendar.

Contact the accounting office at (859) 233-8150 for information about account status.

Information Release Form

Transylvania abides by the 1974 Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), which mandates that academic records be kept confidential. Except for directory information, we will not release other information about a student, including transcripts and grade reports, without the student's written consent. If you have questions about FERPA, contact the registrar's office at (859) 233-8116.

Every student has the opportunity to designate individuals with whom the student's academic progress may be discussed via an electronic form on TNet, the online information portal. Individuals designated on this form will be asked to provide the 4-digit PIN selected by the student in order to verify their identity. Federal regulations prohibit advisers from discussing your student's academic progress unless your student has authorized the release of information. If you believe it would be helpful to speak with your student's adviser, call the registrar's office to obtain the adviser's name, phone number and email address. The authorization form does not allow the university to release grade reports or transcripts.

Grade Reports

Grade reports are provided to students at the end of each term via TNet. The university encourages students to share their academic records with their parents. Grades are not automatically sent to parents, even with the signed Information Release Form, which allows Transylvania to provide you only with limited, general information about your student's academic progress. Study Abroad

Transylvania offers a variety of study abroad and off-campus programs. Students may participate in internships and academic programs year round in the United States and abroad. Call the Office of Study Abroad at (859) 233-8124 for more information.

Career Development

The Career Development Center offers a comprehensive four-year plan to help students focus on goals and prepare for life after college. The center also assists students with finding internships and part-time employment. For more information, call the Career Development Center at (859) 233-8193.



Financial Information

Tuition and fees must be paid by Aug. 1 for fall term and Jan. 1 for winter term, unless other arrangements are made in advance. A 12-month payment plan is also offered, with the first payment due by July 1. Call the accounting office at (859) 233-8150 for more information.

Scholarships and Financial Aid

The four main types of financial assistance are scholarships, grants, loans and work-study (oncampus employment). The financial aid office determines eligibility for financial aid after an applicant has been accepted for admission to the university and all information required for consideration has been received. Residence Life

Housing Requirements

Full-time students must live on campus unless they have achieved senior status (27 course units) before the beginning of fall term, is 21 years old by the date of fall term enrollment, is married, lives with parent(s) or legal guardian, or is carrying an academic load less than three course units. Requests for exemption from the housing requirement should be directed to Hannah Piechowski, assistant director of residence life and housing, at (859) 233-8498.

Resident Advisers and Area Coordinators

Resident advisers are upperclass students who live in the residence halls and are responsible for a floor of about 40 students. RAs serve as mentors and role models, promoting the principles of citizenship, leadership and self-governance. The RAs also receive support from four area coordinators who are upperclass undergraduate and graduate students with previous experience as an RA who reside on campus.

Telephone

Each hall and building is equipped with a phone that has direct connections to the Office of Residence Life and the Department of Public Safety.

Computers

Students who have personal computers with wired or wireless capabilities may connect to the university network from their residence hall rooms and have free access to network software, email and the Internet. Students without personal computers have the same access to the network from computer labs located around campus. Computer facilities also are available at Brown Science Center, Haupt Humanities, Mitchell Fine Arts, Cowgill and the library.

Alcohol and Illicit Drugs

Use of alcoholic beverages by students under 21 and use of illicit drugs are prohibited on campus and at campus-sponsored events. The university considers alcohol consumption by students 21 and older a personal decision and urges students who choose to drink to do so in a mature, responsible manner. Dining Services

Transylvania's dining service provides meals in Forrer Dining Center for resident and commuter students, faculty, staff and visitors. Students living in all residence halls, with the exception of Fourth Street Apartments and our on-campus houses, are required to purchase a meal plan. Students may deposit money to their Crimson Card account which may be used in Forrer Dining Center, the Rafskeller, Jazzman's Café and the 1780 Café. Students with special dietary needs should contact the director of dining services to make arrangements for meals to suit their specific needs. Student Health Services

A nurse practitioner is available on campus Monday-Friday to provide basic health care and assist students in scheduling appointments for further medical attention.

Students requiring hospitalization may choose from four private hospitals and a major regional medical center; the nearest facility is eight blocks from campus. Counseling Services

Confidential counseling sessions with licensed mental health professionals are available during the academic year to help students with academic problems, time management, relationship/ roommate conflict resolution, communication skills, depression, loneliness and homesickness. Public/Campus Safety

Public safety officers are on duty 24 hours a day to provide safety and security for our students, faculty, staff and community.
